As the year comes to an end, it is a great time to reflect upon the highlights of 2022. Most notably, despite the ongoing triple-threat of COVID, RSV and influenza, research endeavors have not diminished. Faculty, fellows and residents continue to embark on new and exciting projects, all with the aim of better caring for our patients.

As the pattern of the pandemic has changed, residents and fellows are finally back to traveling to in-person meetings to present their research, which not only provides a forum to present the work, but also a short respite from business-as-usual!

Notably, in October, 2022, we completed the transformation to a new, national Human Rights Protection Program (HRPP). This transition included a major change in our IRB structure and function. Although the new process takes some time to get used to, and we are still all on a learning curve, we have successfully transitioned to the new format.

As part of that transition, investigators are now asked to fill out an investigator agreement form, once every three years, that the HRPP office keeps on file. We also need a current CV from all investigators. There have also been some changes to our standard consent forms. All currently approved consent forms need to be edited to the new template by the end of the year. Please note that the Ascension St. John consent for case reports has not changed, and we use the same form as before.

Call for Proposals:

The Ascension St. John Hospital Medical Staff Committee has generously allocated funds to help support faculty research. These funds are available for physicians and doctoral level researchers only; residents and fellows may apply for funding via the GME Research committee (as usual). A total of \$20,000 per year has been allocated; individual investigators may request up to \$10,000 for a project. An application format and funding policy have been developed.

The deadline for research proposals and the other required documentation (as listed in the policy) for the Spring 2023 cycle is **February 28, 2023.** Review will occur in March.

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QA/QI or Research?

- As defined by the Common Rule at 45 CFR 46.102(d), the term "research" means a systematic investigation involving human subjects, including research development, testing and evaluation, designed to develop or contribute to generalizable knowledge.
- As defined by the FDA at 21 CFR 50.3(c), the term "research" means an experiment that involves a test article and one or more human subjects.
- Quality improvement (QI) in health care, unlike research, focuses on translating existing knowledge from research into clinical practice to improve the quality of health care for individuals and populations.
- The key difference between these two concepts is that research studies are intended to create new knowledge that can be generalizable to other populations and settings, while QI in health care uses existing knowledge to improve health care outcomes within a local health care institution or setting.

| Points to Consider | Research | QA/QI |
|--------------------|--|--|
| Purpose | To test an hypothesis OR establish clinical practice standards where none are accepted | To assess or promptly improve a process, program or system; OR improve performance as judged by accepted/established standards |
| Goal | To answer a question or test an hypothesis | To improve performance |
| Benefits | Designed to contribute to generalizable knowledge and may or may not benefit subjects | Designed to promptly benefit a process, program or system and may or may not benefit patients |
| Risks/Burdens | May place subjects at risk | By design, does not place subjects at risk, except for possible loss of confidentiality |
| Data Collection | Systematic data collection | Systematic data collection |
| End Point | Answer a research question | Promptly improve a process |
| Testing/Analysis | Statistically disprove an hypothesis | Compare a program/process/ system to an established set of |

Remember, only the IRB can make the official determination if a project falls under the heading of QA/QI or Research. Don't make the mistake of assuming that a project is exempt or is "not human subjects research" without consulting the IRB.
